Garden to-dos for September

Prune perennials. Plant bulbs, trees. Fertilize palms with slow release fertilizer. Most palms are deficient in potassium, so add Muriate of Potash to correct the deficiency. Apply organic matter to roses, fertilize, and prune back 1/3. This is the last month to fertilize citrus trees. Plant Marigolds, chrysanthemums, onions, basil, parsley, lettuce, carrots, cabbage, broccoli.

The Garden Maven's Advice to the "Floralorn"

Dear Garden Maven,

I planted some passionflower on my arbor last year to attract butterflies. It has worked too well. The caterpillars have devoured every leaf on the plants, leaving some ugly stems. My arbor looks anything but inviting. What can I do to make it look better while staying attractive to the butterflies/caterpillars?

Butterflies are not free

Dear Butterflies,

It's true, our gardens need to suffer a little bit to be attractive to butterflies. And sometimes this involves providing some good looking plant that will entice the caterpillars to scarf down all the leaves. Fortunately, Mother Nature has showed them how to do this without killing the plant. Your leaves will come back in time to feed next year's crop of would be gulf fritillaries (or zebra longwings). In the meantime, plant another vine that can keep the arbor looking good but that is not so vigorous that it smothers the passionflower. Climbing roses are good. The passionflower leaves will get enough sunlight to thrive, and the roses will camouflage the chewed off foliage. And the butterflies will like the flowers. A win for both of you!
